

Dear Friends,

We have been talking a lot lately about hospitality and what it will take to be known as one of the most welcoming churches in the neighborhood. In the reading I have been doing on this subject, I came across this interesting article by Gary Shockley. In it he describes a recent visit to a church.

I recently visited a church where, and I kid you not, they had two posters on the wall near the entrance to the sanctuary with pictures of certain clothing styles that were on one poster unacceptable and on the other acceptable to wear. As I walked inside, I was met by another sign that said, "No food or drink beyond this point. This means YOU!" Just beyond that sign was another one that read, "Those who truly honor Christ kneel when they receive Communion." The real kicker was the words printed in their bulletin: "Everyone welcome!" Nobody can make this stuff up.

It is easy to say "Everyone Welcome!" with our words but convey something very different with our actions. Sometimes when a church says, "Everyone's Welcome," what they mean is everyone "like us" is welcome. I meet people all the time — faithful people, smart people, good and decent people — who have walked away from the church because they have come up against our barricades — our rules, regulations, dress codes, and expectations of behavior.

But what makes me so proud to be your pastor is that I get the sense that you don't want to be that kind of church. You are really opening yourself up to new people. From ushers and greeters to coffee hour hosts and Sunday school teachers, to music leaders and custodial staff, you are making spaces, transforming traditions, and showing flexibility and grace. We will be singing a song each week of this series that says, "All are welcome in this place." I am proud that it is more than just a song - it the way we are trying to live!
