Dear Friends,

When you come into ministry, you think it's a sprint. That your job is to get as much done as quickly as you can. How much can we accomplish in the shortest amount of time?

Later, you wake up and think that ministry is not a sprint but it's a marathon. What can I do to be in this for the long haul? How can I make a long lasting impact on people and communities? You start to pace yourself differently, hoping to not peak too soon and have enough gas in the tank to finish strong.

Then, finally, the Holy Spirit taps you on the shoulder and says, "Ministry is not a sprint or a marathon - it is a relay." Ministry is a baton that is passed from one generation to the next.
