Dear Friends,

My first job in ministry was as a high school youth pastor. I showed up for work on July 1 and within the week Bridget and I jumped in a caravan and were headed to Memphis, Tennessee with seventy teenagers we were meeting for the first time.

We were off for a week-long mission trip, helping to do basic home repair in the Binghampton neighborhood, one of poorest sections of Memphis. I spent the week in 100% humidity, 90 degree weather, scraping paint, sanding drywall, and laying insulation in the cramped attic of Miss Leddy's home. The best part of the week was working alongside some of the neatest young people I had the pleasure to ever meet. By the time the week was over a lot of good work had been accomplished, a lot of good relationships were formed and a lot of good will was left in all of our hearts. Over the next fifteen years Bridget and I went on nineteen mission trips with young people. These experiences the church gives young people are the most valuable gifts we can offer.


