Sunday, November 4, 12:00 pm

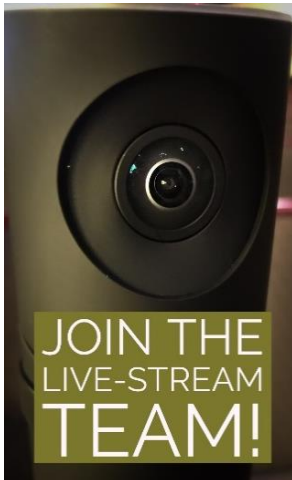

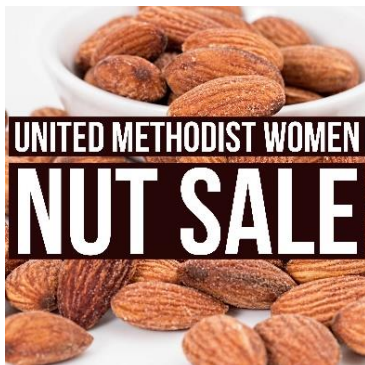

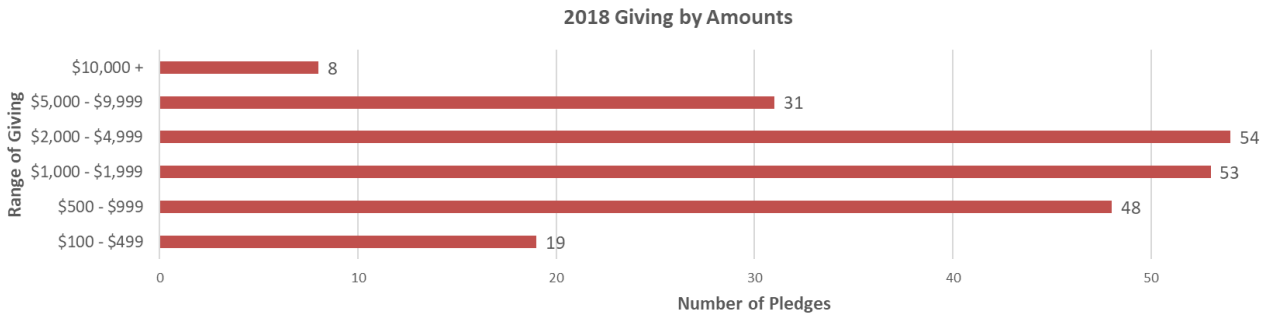
The flowers on the Altar are given in celebration of Faye Bond's birthday, given by her son and daughter-in-law, Mark and Joany.



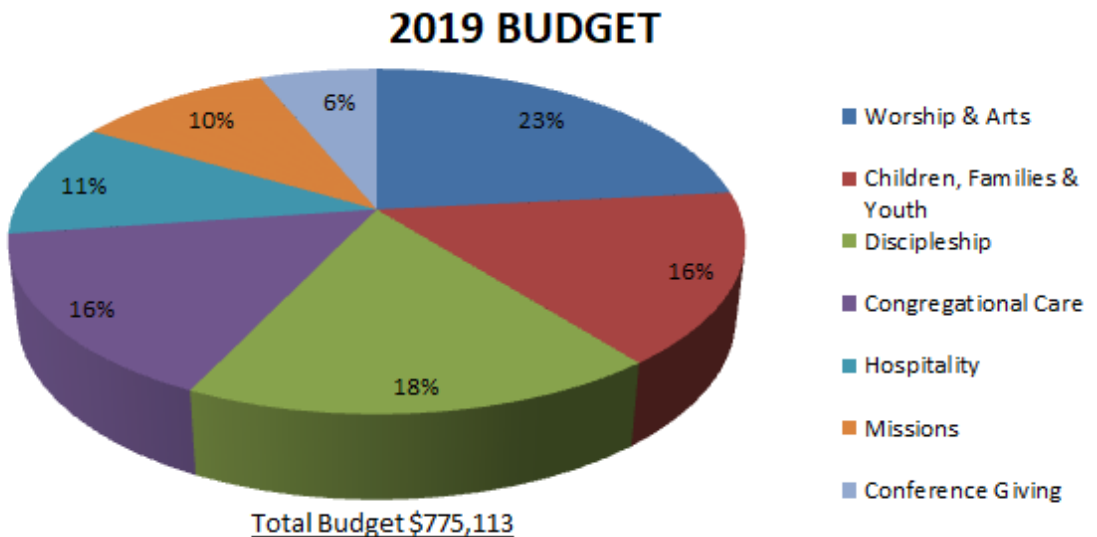
STEWARDSHIP QUESTIONS

This month, you will hear a lot about the ways that your generosity helps make Christ's love real. You may have some questions about how we put your generosity to use to do that. We have compiled some of the most frequently asked questions to help.

1. What is the pledge range?
 - a. Below is a graph showing the range of giving from last year's stewardship campaign.



2. How do our financial gifts support the ministries of the church?
 - a. This pie chart shows how our budget dollars are allocated among our ministries.



3. Why is there a budget increase?
 - a. The 6.4% increase is due to a more realistic budget for areas that have higher expenses than previously anticipated like administration and building maintenance. Administration has service contracts for copiers and other electronic equipment vital to supporting the activities of the church. Utility bills will increase with the move into our newly renovated space and the increased programming that we will be able to support. Additional staffing for a part time associate pastor, custodian and evening desk receptionist are also built into the 2019 budget.
4. What is covered in the Worship and Arts budget?
 - a. The budget covers rosebud and altar expenses, communion supplies, worship expenses, instrumentalists, and instrument maintenance. The budget supports our Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday worship services and additional special services and programs throughout the year.
5. What is covered in the Children, Families, and Youth budget?
 - a. This supports our Sunday School, Bible Study, and other special programs.
6. What is covered in the Congregational Care budget?
 - a. Congregational Care supports visitation for hospital patients and shut-ins as well as other support services for members of our congregation and affiliated people who need special assistance.
7. What is the focus of our Hospitality ministries?
 - a. Our Hospitality Ministries strive to ensure that everyone who visits our church is glad to have come. Some of the ways we do this are by providing refreshments for Fellowship Hour; keeping in touch with visitors after they come to the church; and creating welcoming environments inside the church, on the grounds, and online.
8. How are our missions funded?
 - a. There isn't a separate budget for Missions. Mailings and other administrative costs are covered under the Administration budget. Our pastors, staff, and volunteers provide leadership. Funding is provided through your gifts. In addition to nearly \$25,000 in financial gifts we have donated thousands of items like pillows, blankets, food, and toiletries.

- Develop a network of care where seniors are not cast aside, forgotten, or alone.


This is what happens when we fill out our pledge card.
