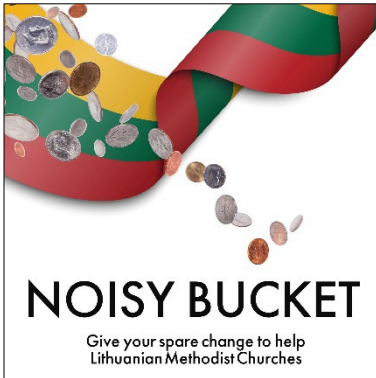


WHY SHOULD YOU VOLUNTEER AT FISH DINNERS?

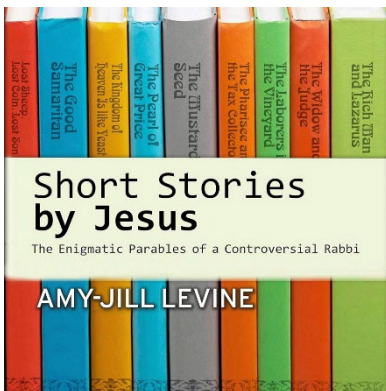

MOVIE SCREENING & DISCUSSION

Royal Oak First is partnering with Journey Center of Michigan to host a **viewing and contemplative discussion** of the documentary “1946: *The Mistranslation that Shifted a Culture*” on **Sunday, March 9, from 1:00-4:00 p.m.** The documentary follows researchers who trace the origins of the anti-gay movement among Christians to a Bible translation choice in 1946. It chronicles the discovery of archives at Yale University which unveil astonishing new revelations and cast significant doubt on any biblical basis for LGBTQIA+ prejudice. Featuring commentary from scholars, pastors, and the film’s creators, “1946” is at once challenging, enlightening, and inspiring. Please note the goal that this conversation be held with an atmosphere of respect, civility, love, and open-hearted sharing and listening to one another.

LETTER FROM OUR PREACHER

Hello Church Friends!

As I finish this letter, snow is beginning to fall softly out the window of my studio. I love snow. At least I love looking at it and sometimes walking in it. I do not, however, love shoveling it off the sidewalk and driveway or driving in it. It seems fitting that while I'm thinking about this message, the world around me is about to be blanketed in a soft, bright hug of snow. I will have to contend with it for good or for ill.

There is a lot to be concerned about in our current cultural climate as well. At the same time there is much for me to be grateful for. It has been said to me on multiple occasions that a thought of gratitude is a pure prayer. I need to look to God as the source of this gratitude, but sometimes I cannot see it alone. I must then look to others in our faith community to find it. Left to my own resources I can quickly sink into despair.

Most of us are likely familiar with the Beatitudes, Matthew's version of these teachings from Jesus, most often referred to in the Sermon on the Mount. We may be slightly less so with Luke's version of this, usually called the Sermon on the Plain. There are similarities but also differences. It is in these differences and details that we look to this week for a message of hope. We tend to turn to these sayings for comfort, look for and find blessings in our everyday lives. But there is more to these words; some of it can be a little hard to take. "Rejoice in that day," Jesus says, not about the good things that happen, but about suffering, hatred, rejection, and life struggles. Is this something we want to feel joyful about? If you are like me, it can be hard to digest. But there is good news. I can find comfort in these words as well as discomfort. This is the invitation that Jesus issues here, but how do we find that?

This is about trusting in faith and living out that faith in community. We don't rejoice because of hurt or pain, but we rejoice that we have a community that can help us heal from the hurt. We have relationships that can insulate and protect us from sufferings that we encounter in the world. We can celebrate that community of support and encouragement. We give thanks for one another and how we have been wrapped up in a loving environment that helps shape our identity as a contrast to the identity we sometimes encounter in the world.

Our Father is a God of love, and it is in community that we need to find, express, and celebrate this love. The joy that we seek is not in the hurt or the pain that has come from the world but in the sustaining faith and the comforts in a community that receives its healing hope and love from the Eternal Source.
